

Beny, as you begin this new chapter, I wish you many years of good health and good humour.



And most of all, you teach Judaism through music, deepening our connection to our ancient tradition, our modern State, and to each other. Thank you and looking forward to continuing to learn from you!



For the last few years, Cantor Maissner has been a shining light at our annual Cantors Conventions, sharing with us the benefit of his talent and the wisdom of his experience.



My Dear Beny,

I am happy to be with you at this important point in your life, your retirement after 41 years as Cantor of the Holy Blossom Temple. Well, after such a long period of four decades and a bustling career, servicing the community and proliferating cantorial music, one is indeed permitted to retire.

You have had one of the richest careers in the cantorate. Few cantors could boast of a similar long and varied career. You have led innumerable services in the synagogue, and you have given many concerts in your temple and in many other places through various countries. You have recorded a great variety of music, ranging from traditional Hazzanut to Yiddish and Hebrew folk songs and art music. The list of your collected recordings alone would have sufficed to fill the bios of four other Hazzanim and no wonder that you have been working so hard to collect the recordings and present them in digitized form. You have conducted several choirs, including your favorite Lachan group. You have taught God-knows how many Bar and Bat Mitzvah students and officiated in unnumbered lifecycle events.

During your wide-span cantorial career, synagogue music underwent enormous changes, even revolutions, from the traditional Eastern-European coloratura Hazzanut that you studied with the great master Leib Glantz through the special cantorial style of your illustrious uncle Israel Alter to modern synagogue music by composers such as Max Janowski, Max Helfman, Ben Steinberg and others to the new postmodern fashions of Carlebach, Danny Masseng and others. You were able to adopt the new styles and adapt them to your congregational needs. Indeed, through time you were able to reshape your own orientation from a virtuoso star to a true leader of the congregation without losing your ability to go back to the former styles when needed and when they served the prayer best.

Judging from your pep and enthusiasm, it seems that you are retiring in mid-career. You certainly could have gone on for a number of years. But as the wisest of all men said in his Proverbs, there is a time for everything, and retirement time has come.

From my own experience, being myself a veteran retiree, I know the hesitations and indeed the anxiety that precedes retirement. Yet, again as a long-time retired person now, I would like to assure you that there is life after retirement.

My dear Benny, your title Cantor will always be with you and so will your vast knowledge of cantorial music and your cantorial immense expertise. These you will be able to impart to future cantors. Please do not expect that all the young cantors will flock to partake in what you are able to feed them. Times have changed and synagogues now opt for the simplest tunes. Still, I am sure that you will be able to teach and help promote part of our rich cantorial tradition to the younger generation






Becoming a Singing Congregation: Cantor Benjamin Maissner's Holy Blossom Temple Legacy

A Career in Brief

In the spring of 1979, a 35-year-old Israeli Cantor from Germantown Jewish Centre in Philadelphia successfully interviewed and auditioned to succeed Sheldon Merel as Cantor and Musical Director of Holy Blossom Temple. Three months later, Cantor Benjamin Maissner, Hope, and their children—Shira, Tal and Rivka—crossed the border to Canada, as landed immigrants, and settled in mid-town Toronto. With the High Holy Days quickly approaching, Beny immediately immersed himself in the role and responsibilities of Shliach Tzibbur. Shortly thereafter, he began the career-long process of expanding Holy Blossom's musical repertoire and programing.

Over 41 years, Cantor Maissner led our congregation on a journey in music that inspired our prayers, elevated our celebrations, challenged our musical literacy, and shaped the heart and soul of Holy Blossom Temple. In the process, both Holy Blossom and Beny earned international reputations for Jewish music, Holy Blossom for its eclectic musical expressions and Beny for his extensive knowledge and repertoire. Here are the highlights of this collective journey, in no particular order, with a few pre-Holy Blossom activities and accomplishments for completeness.

At Holy Blossom

"When I walk into performing a wedding and the bride comes over to me and says, 'you did my bat mitzvah' and the mother comes over and she says, 'you did my wedding', that is the price and the reward that we achieve after 41 years. I now do bar mitzvahs of children whose parents I did bar mitzvahs for. But I always tell the children, 'I was much harder on your father or your mother'."

- Officiated at thousands of worship services and ceremonies (2010).
- Officiated at life cycle events for <u>multiple</u> <u>generations</u> of congregants.

- Participated in Purim shpiels (2014, 2019) and fun promotional videos for High Holy Days (2013, 2014, 2017), Hanukkah (2014, 2016) and Purim (2012, 2013, 2016, 2019).
- Delivered hundreds of lectures, talks, seminars, workshops, tutorials, and lessons, often in song, related to Jewish liturgical and secular music (2011, 2012, 2012, 2012, 2012, 2013, 2016, 2018).
- ✓ Visited with and comforted hundreds of congregants who were ill or incapacitated.
- Co-created special programing for Shabbat Shira (1989, 2012, 2020), Yom Yerushalayim, Yom Ha'Atzmaut (2015, 2019, 2020), and Passover (2019)
- Developed and conducted two Holy Blossom choirs, the professional choir and the award-winning Temple Singers, which help to lead worship services throughout the year and join with Lachan Jewish Chamber Choir for special concerts (2011, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2019).
- Commissioned compositions for Holy Blossom Temple, including "Pirchei Kodesh" by Stephen Glass and Benjamin Maissner, for the dedication of the Schwartz/Reisman Atrium (2018); "Simchat Shabbat" by Cantor Sol Zim; "Hallel, Psalms 113-118" by Cantor Ralph Schlossberg; "The Recreation of the World" by Michael Isaacson; "Mi Sheberah" by Cantor Meir Finkelstein; "Kol Koch El Boker" by Yafim Adler; "Eshet Chayil" by Milton Barnes, commissioned with David Sandler in memory of Bunny Sandler; "Mi Yitneini" for Yom Kippur afternoon, "Kedusah"

- for three festivals, "Un'Taneh Tokef" for High Holy Days, and "L'Dor Vador" for Shabbat, all by Cantor Jerome Kopmar; among other commissions by Ben Steinberg, Yaffim Adler, Sid Rabinowitz, Milton Barnes, Srul Irving Glick, and Harvey Paterson.
- Organized and performed in countless <u>concerts</u> (2011, 2011, 2011, 2011, 2011, 2011, 2011, 2011, 2012, 2012, 2012, 2012, 2013, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2017, 2017), including "Baroque and Beyond", Leonard Bernstein's "Chichester Psalms", "From Shtetl to Broadway" (video, video, CD1, CD2), Ernest Bloch's "Sacred Service", Abraham Kaplan's "Glorious", and Felix Mendelssohn's "Elijah" with the Dresdner Philharmonie and world-renowned Dresdner Kreuzchor. Many of these concerts were part of the Musical Heritage Concert Series and featured Lachan, Temple Singers and Holy Blossom's professional choir.
- Guided the vision for and creation of "<u>Siddur Pirchei</u> <u>Kodesh</u>", with Rabbis Moscowitz and Splansky.
- ✓ Led congregational trips to <u>Israel</u>, <u>Germany</u>, <u>Poland</u>, and <u>Spain</u>.
- Formed and conducted the N'ginah band, to enhance Kabbalat Shabbat services.
- Formed and conducted a children's choir.
- Entertained participants of the Mondays @ the <u>Temple for Seniors Program.</u>
- Played guitar and sang with the youngest members of our congregation on many occasions.
- Coached hundreds of b'nei mitzvah to become bimah ready.
- Coached dozens of lay Shlichei Tzibbur.
- Added musical moments to countless programs and presentations.

- Lectured, conducted workshops and performed at Cantorial conferences around the world (2006, 2010, 2016, 2016, 2018 2020).
- Edited the "Cantor's Lifecycle Manual" for the American Conference of Cantors.
- Held leadership positions with the Toronto Council of Hazzanim, American Conference of Cantors, and Cantors' Assembly of America. Was Chair of the American Conference of Cantors certification program.

- Taught at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia, Jewish Theological Seminary in New York, Geiger College at the University of Potsdam in Germany (2019, 2019), and Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem, New York and Cincinnati.
- Served as Cantor-in-residence for Hebrew Union College.
- Taught and mentored numerous <u>cantorial</u> <u>students</u>, many of whom serve some of the most important synagogues in North America. This includes <u>David Rosen</u>, our incoming Senior Cantor.
- Formed, conducted and toured with Toronto's Lachan Jewish Chamber Choir (article, article, 2014), including trips to Detroit, Ottawa, Nuremberg, Hanover, China, and Bulgaria (2018, 2018), the latter of which also included members of the Temple Singers and Holy Blossom's professional choir.
- ☐ Recorded dozens of CDs of liturgical, holiday and concert music, many with Lachan.
- Arranged interfaith concerts (2014, 2015), including The Sufi Whirling Dervishes, The Japanese Shinonome Chorus, and many Christian choirs performing with Lachan.

An Evolving Congregation

The scope of these activities and accomplishments is undoubtedly impressive, if not overwhelming. Yet, Cantor Maissner's impact on Holy Blossom Temple has been far more profound than they signify. If you ask the Cantor, and we did, what he is most proud of in his 41 years, it is that we became a singing congregation. "Nowadays, it's a thrill that the moment I open my mouth everybody sings. Even if I make up a niggun and I sing the first phrase twice, the congregation joins with me."

That was not the case when Beny arrived at Holy Blossom, as several of us will remember. Worship services were formal, with highly sophisticated liturgical music arranged for organ and a professional choir. The organ and choir were situated on the balcony, at the back of the sanctuary under the rose window. The choir faced the bimah. Douglas Bodle, the organist and conductor, had his back to it and watched the Cantor through a small mirror. Beny was grateful for these resources, which many of his colleagues did not have. But he recognized that the situation encouraged congregants to be passive during services and created a disconnect between himself and the congregation. In addition, the physical distance from balcony to bimah caused an acoustic delay. This limited music in the sanctuary to slower, more romantic styles, preventing Beny from using any of the rhythmic and upbeat melodies he brought with him from Philadelphia.

Things began to change in the early 1990s, when the organ fortuitously overheated during services. Not feasible to repair, it was replaced by a sophisticated and portable keyboard. The choir and accompanist were relocated beside the bimah, to the Cantor's right and within sight of the congregation. This afforded the Cantor more musical flexibility and provided space for the Temple Singers to join the professionals. Beny's vision for worship was not fully realized, however, until the 2005 High Holy Days season, 26 years into his tenure. The lower bimah was established that summer, moving the Rabbis and Cantor closer to each other and to the congregation and choir. Despite the sanctuary's enormous size, Beny felt a new intimacy with the congregation







that was reminiscent of the <u>Israeli shteibl of his youth</u>, where the seeds of chazzanut began to grow. In this familiar milieu, he not only conducted the choir, but also the congregation, encouraging us with gestures, direct eye contact and repeated phrases to sing along and even clap, the latter of which would never have taken place in the sanctuary of old. "I believe that even if I do something new, if there's a phrase in the middle of the music that I think the congregation could catch onto, I will stop, and I will ask the people to repeat the phrase with me." With improved communication between the Cantor, congregation, choirs, and Rabbis, the collaborative exploration of a broad range of songs, melodies and musical styles was now possible.

in Beny's words

Long before these physical modifications and despite the barriers and challenges that existed, Cantor Maissner was already introducing simple, contemporary compositions and having the more complex compositions rearranged for our use. This was necessitated, in part, by the "Gates of Repentance" prayer book for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, which had been introduced shortly before the Cantor's arrival at Holy Blossom but not fully set to music for the congregation. Excited to show off his repertoire of musical traditions and styles, Beny asked Rabbi Harvey Fields^{z¹}, "Do you want it traditional, romantic, classical, baroque? Anything you want". Not everyone was happy with so many <u>musical changes in the early years</u>, however. Beny recalls one congregant complaining to Rabbi Fields. Another charged Beny with being "too Jewish" for Holy Blossom. Both became ardent supporters and close personal friends.

The Cantor's efforts to expand Holy Blossom's musical repertoire continued. With Rabbi Dow Marmur, Beny revised the music for Yizkor and the Martyrology service and introduced modern pieces on Yom Kippur morning. With Rabbi John Moscowitz, he reformed the music for the Shalosh Regalim and increased participation of the Temple Singers to two Shabbat services per month. And with Rabbi Yael Splansky, as editor, Beny participated in the creation of "Siddur Pirchei Kodesh", which embodies a vision for worship that he and Rabbi Moscowitz shared. As Rabbi Splansky notes, "Beny's fingerprints are on every page of that prayer book". Throughout, the Temple Singers,








professional choir, and Nadia Adler, accompanist and collaborator for 30 years, worked hard to keep pace. Their unwavering dedication to acquiring such a diverse and challenging repertoire of music is most worthy of our praise and gratitude. Beny recalls the surprise of a colleague, who declared, "I've never heard it before!", when witnessing our congregation and choirs sing, in four-part harmony, a sophisticated composition written for the Cantor and a professional choir.

in Beny's words

With a broad musical range at his disposal and the long-time partnership of Cantorial Soloist Lindi Rivers, Beny seamlessly (sometimes even surreptitiously) integrates tunes that are simple and complex, old and new, and familiar and unfamiliar. "I will choose something that is familiar, so the congregation can participate. But within that regularity, I manage to do one or two out of the box." Medieval to contemporary, Hassidic to Reform, Sephardic, Ashkenazic, Oriental, Iraqi, Moroccan, American, Israeli, Yiddish, Hebrew, and English, the Cantor has done it all, and with relevant accents, flourishes and trills, and baritone, guttural and nasal qualities. He marvels, "I cannot believe the kind of music that we did, not only in concerts but in services, and the repertoire that the choir and the congregation have".

The physical changes to the sanctuary, the expansion of our musical repertoire, and the integration of Temple Singers contributed greatly to our participation in services. But even together, they do not tell the complete story. Whether we pray with Beny in the sanctuary, Herman chapel, youth chapel, or Mishkan, his personal warmth, sense of humour, intelligence, charisma, passion for Judaism, God and music, and the sincerity with which he himself prays and teaches engage us, envelop us, elevate us, and imbue our minds, hearts and voices with the enduring power of song. A congregant of many years observed that Cantor Maissner raised the musical IQ of our congregation. Indeed, he has. But he has also raised our musical EQ, or emotional quotient. Beny identifies this as participating with emotion, meaning, the willingness and ability "to surrender to the sound and the interpretation of the piece of music". And herein lies the core insight. Beny nurtured our singing congregation by raising our musical IQ and EQ.
















From Strength to Strength

In his interview for the job at Holy Blossom Temple, Cantor Maissner articulated a desire to teach the values of Judaism through music. In doing so, he has helped us to understand, experience and internalize the musical traditions of our people, through time and place; to connect in prayer and celebration with fellow Jews, at home and abroad; and to explore the depths of our personal and collective Jewish identity. This has inspired many congregants, with encouragement and support from Beny and Lindi, to become Shlichei Tzibbur. "I'm very proud of our congregation. It's a sense of joy to listen to lay people get up and read the Torah and lead the services. Or go to shiva homes and lead services." It is with tremendous musical capacity, therefore, that Holy Blossom Temple moves into the next chapter of our history.

As for Beny, all of these accomplishments might have earned him the right to coast along this past year, his last as Holy Blossom's Senior Cantor and Musical Director. But that is not in his nature. "I always try to do something new, to interest myself." As a result, he and Mari Lynn Rusak, his administrative assistant for many years, have been very busy. And to that we say, Beny sure knows how to make an exit! Retirement is likely not to slow him down, either. Along with Cantor Emeritus responsibilities at Holy Blossom, Beny hopes to do more teaching and mentoring, and, as he says, "to share my experience and my knowledge and to bring the life of Holy Blossom out in the world and demonstrate, proudly, what we did here in 41 years".

Hope, The Other Side of Beny

Behind every successful person is a super-capable partner. We are all familiar with at least one version of this sentiment. For Cantor Maissner, that partner is his wife of 52 years, Hope. Hope has been the enabler, supporting Beny's endeavours while maintaining a career in nursing, a small business, and their full and fulfilling home life. Over the years, Hope has also made her own contributions to the Jewish community and to Holy Blossom Temple, for which we are very grateful.

Relocating to Toronto with three young children, Hope initially had her hands full. Participation in Temple life was limited to attending worship services and special events. "In the early years, the challenge for me was sitting with three children in the congregation. I tried everything. I tried sitting on the main floor. I tried sitting on the balcony. The balcony worked best because it was close to Beny's office. I could escape out the door if we needed to." Eventually, Hope began to selectively volunteer. With Beit Halochem, which provides aid to Israel's disabled military veterans, Hope rose to become the national Vice President. Holy Blossom's association with Beit Halochem is a result of her 20-year involvement. As a member of Holy Blossom's Soviet Jewry Committee, Hope gathered materials for congregant missions to the Soviet Union and provided support for those pairing with refusenik families, in celebration of becoming b'nei mitzvah. In 1990, she accompanied Beny on a mission to visit with and give concerts for refuseniks.

But Hope is most widely recognized for co-leading congregational trips abroad and for managing Holy Blossom's Judaica Shop. She organized two trips to Israel and one each to Germany, Poland and Spain.

Notwithstanding the assistance of a travel agent, Hope was responsible for logistics and dealing with complications on-the-fly. "Beny was the Commander-in-Chief and I was the liaison between Beny and the group." Hope's connection to our beautiful Judaica Shop began with a home-based business called Tikvah Tableware, through which she imported Judaica, mostly from Israel, and supplied several synagogue shops with inventory on consignment, including Holy Blossom's.

Twenty years ago, Hope assumed responsibility for the management













of our shop and facilitated its transition to the Schwartz/Reisman Atrium. She is presently training over 30 volunteers and members of Sisterhood, in preparation for her own retirement, although she may, from time to time, continue to volunteer in the shop.

Despite her involvement and regular presence at Holy Blossom, Hope likes to be behind the scenes. Shy by nature, she leaves the spotlight for Beny. But make no mistake, Hope has been integral to the Cantor's accomplishments and has contributed her own talents, intelligence, knowledge, and good judgment to our thriving congregation. She was honoured by Sisterhood on May 24, 2020, at the Rosh Chodesh Sivan Shacharit service. We also honour her here, acknowledging, as Beny himself often does, that without Hope he would not have been able to achieve his vision for Holy Blossom Temple.



Dear Holy Blossom Family,

It was a privilege to grow up in a synagogue as prestigious as Holy Blossom. Watching our father over the years has been an honour and awe-inspiring. In an age where nothing seems to last, staying somewhere for 41 years is a significant accomplishment. We were fortunate and blessed to be part of this extraordinary journey. His leadership taught us many important things about life; significance of tradition, dedication of oneself, along with commitment to community and family.

These lessons manifested through his actions and we came to understand the deeper meaning of how Aba actualized these things for himself and for us. Aba showed us that our traditions are a link to the past and to the future. Traditions connect us to family, community and the world at large. In his dedication to community and family, he taught us to just be present. We saw this commitment through his ongoing involvement in Temple life, B'nai Mitzvah lessons, choir practice, weekly visits to hospitals, visits with congregants and shiva calls, or simply dropping by our homes and playing with his beloved grandchildren.

Our mother's unwavering support allowed our father's many visions to come to fruition. She is the glue that holds it all together. From their beginnings to present, she continues to ensure life runs smoothly on all fronts so he can be there for others. Her commitment to tradition and community parallels his and together they modeled the

most important life lessons for us. We have all taken these lessons and made them our own.

Collectively we (the congregation included) have memories of us as little children sitting in the main sanctuary on shabbat morning and the High Holidays with our mother. This was a rare sight in the early years at Holy Blossom but now it is a regular occurrence. You watched us become Bar and Bat Mitzvah, blow shofar, get married and have children- all with warmth and a general interest in who we are. Now there are new memories of the Maissner grandchildren as part of the Holy Blossom Family singing and joining Saba on the Bimah.

When starting his career our father wrote in his entrance application to the Hebrew Union College that his vision was to blend the old traditions with the new. This melding to old world traditions with new sounds and customs has been his gift to the world of Jewish Liturgical Music and beyond. One of the best illustrations of this is in the melodies that Aba brought to this congregation. This can really be seen during the High Holidays when he sings the Nigun for Al Chet or the Tefillah for Israeli Soldiers and the State of Israel, Aveinu Sheba Shamayim.

Aba's energy and zest for life is ever present whether, at Temple, performing at Carnegie Hall, in Hannover, receiving an Honoree Doctorate, traveling the world with congregants or just playing with the grandchildren. Observing him fulfill his dream of combining traditionalism and modernism in Jewish music and renewal has been amazing. This culminated in witnessing him receive the German Cross, the highest award bestowed on a non- German citizen. He was presented with this award for bringing Jewish Music and Culture back to Germany. This acknowledgement by the German government was truly the culmination and closing of a circle of a family legacy left by his Great Uncle Cantor Israel Alter Z"L. Our father continues to build this legacy, not only for the congregation and the Jewish music world but for our family as well, leaving this gift for future generations.

One often hears about the nachat/pride that a person receives from their children but we have been blessed to have had that experience in watching our father over all these years. Wherever we go people pay warm tribute to him and his contributions. But nothing quite compares to the nachat we felt when we recently heard a congregant refer to Holy Blossom as the "Singing Shul". This is perhaps the greatest of our father's legacies!

Whenever we return with our own families for High Holiday services we are always moved by the full sound in the sanctuary. The Kehilla lifting each other's spirit with participation from all ages, singing along to the well known sacred tunes. No matter where we go in the world, there



is nothing like the services at Holy Blossom. In mixing the worlds of tradition and modernity, Aba successfully created the unique sounds that he envisioned as a young Cantor.

For 41 years we have all been guided by a very pure sweet angelic voice echoing our prayers through this holy space. We have cherished this experience together. As his family, we felt the congregation's appreciation and love for this comforting familiar sound.

There is a bright new sound on the horizon and we know with full faith that our Aba has taught this congregation to open hearts and voices to new sounds in prayer. Wherever these sounds may come from, we know you will welcome and learn them so they can blossom here too!

Mazel Tov Aba and the entire congregation!


