RABBINIC REFLECTION



The Jewish Self: Hidden and Revealed

When Esther is new to the throne, she conceals her Jewish identity. "Esther did not reveal her people or her kindred, for

Mordecai charged her that she should not speak of it." (Esther 2:10). The tragedy of Esther's early character is that she hides her true self away. Mordechai must have believed he was protecting her, when in fact, he was putting her at risk. Young people need to know who they are as Jews and must be able to express it. When they do, they can rise to the occasion of life and do extraordinary things. We learn this from Esther.

Chapter 5 of the Megillah begins: "Now it came to pass on the third day, that Esther dressed herself in royalty, and stood in the inner court of the king's house." The Rabbis of the Talmud ask: "Shouldn't it say that she dressed herself 'in garments of royalty'? What was the 'royalty' she wore to address King Achashvarosh and lay out the plan to protect her people? Our Sages answer: "She dressed herself in ruach hakodesh, in the spirit of holiness." (Megillah 14b) Esther did not adorn herself in a queen's costume, she proudly donned her Jewish identity. She wore it like a suit of armour. Knowing who she was, where she came from, and what she ought to do, there was no challenge she could not face. Knowing where she came from and that she was a part of a much larger story, she could walk with newfound confidence and purpose.

In the Pesach narrative God's strength is revealed through supernatural miracles. In the Purim narrative, God's strength is revealed through the extraordinary deeds of ordinary people. Both are stories of redemption. In the book of Exodus, God's name appears everywhere for all to see. Even Pharoah and Egypt's taskmasters are able to see God's hand at work in the world. In the Megillah of Esther, by stark contrast, God's name is completely absent, although everywhere, hidden just beneath the surface, in the deeds of our human heroes at work in the world. Esther's very name means 'hidden.' In his book, *Masking and Unmasking Ourselves: Interpreting Biblical Texts on Clothing & Identity,* Rabbi Professor Norman Cohen teaches that Purim celebrates the holy "sparks which are hidden beneath the surface of our lives, and our task to sew those sparks into a full garment of splendor to enhance the majesty of our souls."

The Masks We Wear

Purim calls attention to the masks we wear and the people we pretend to be. At the end of the day of carnivals and costumes, when the hamantashen are gone and the schnapps has worn off, we remove the mask to reveal who we really are. And then there is one more layer beneath. Still waiting to be revealed is the person we ought to become, but are not yet! Judaism is the way to that innermost self. Judaism is the way for Divine sparks, too often concealed in this world, to be uncovered.

This bulletin is dedicated to the children and teens of Holy Blossom Temple. It is a celebration of the joy they bring to our congregation and of the great potential we see in them. We honour their parents, their grandparents, and their teachers for nurturing the *ruach hakodesh*, the spirit of holiness in each of them. Too often, the world tells them to cover up the fullness of their Jewish identity and ignore the inner life of the *neshamah*. But here at Holy Blossom, through study, prayer, and belonging, they are able to remove the masks, discover something that was hidden within. And here, where we see each and every one of them as absolutely necessary for the Jewish future and the world, they are encouraged to imagine the person they will yet become.

One More Mask

What do we learn from the airplane instructions before take-off? Place the oxygen mask on yourself before assisting your children. What is true about Jewish learning for our children, is true for their guardians. What is true about tending to the child's neshamah, is true for their parent's spiritual life, too. What is true about a teenager's need to give expression to their Jewish identity, is true for those who love them, too.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

In the last bulletin, I shared information about the HBT Strategic Plan that was shared at our Annual General Meeting in early December. In mid-January, at a day-long Board and

Staff retreat we delved deeper into a few of the 10 strategic initiatives that we are focussing on this year, relating specifically to membership, youth education and young families. I am happy to report that the strategic initiatives are being fleshed out into realistic and timebound actions to be implemented.

I am increasingly aware of the challenges faced by synagogues to attract and retain young families as religious affiliation is declining, the number of "Jews of no religion" is increasing, and young Jews are said to be looking for alternative ways to experience Judaism. At Holy Blossom our congregation is growing younger. We've had success welcoming and supporting young families through our Terumah program, where families make a membership contribution according to their ability. As well our schools (YEC and Early Childhood) are growing to accommodate increased demand, and our Summer Blossoms camp is already full! The continued vitality and strength of the Jewish community depends on our providing meaningful experiences for families with young children.

My children are now in their 30s, and I have fond memories of Holy Blossom being the place where I had no worries when they were 'wandering' (running) around without parental supervision. They felt so much at home here having attended Religious School three times a week, in addition to Shabbat Family services. We celebrated the Jewish holy days and festivals together with many other young families whose children have grown up together at HBT. We attended Family Camp together when our children were young, until they were old enough to attend summer camps such as URJ Camp George. We volunteered at family-friendly Temple events and took on increasing leadership roles. We were involved in creating and leading the young family community. Holy Blossom is a hidden jewel, a sacred flower. Holy Blossom Temple is over 165 years old, and we have a gorgeous, renovated building that is increasingly bursting with activity. The busiest and most boisterous services during the High Holy Days this year were downstairs in the Philip Smith Hall, where many gathered for Family Services – young families, and grandparents too. If you have been at HBT hanging out at the Holy Grounds Cafe in the Schwartz/Reisman Atrium on a weekday morning, as I do, you will witness the parade of pre-school children and adults, arriving or departing. On Sunday mornings, there is a similar and louder parade of school-aged children.

What else can we offer to help families on their Jewish parenting journey - for both the adults and the children? Lay leaders and professional staff are always striving to create a stronger sense of community among our young families. We do it by involving young families in creating and leading the community. Now that many of us are back at Holy Blossom in person, there are more opportunities to involve parents and grandparents in supporting the Early Childhood Centre (ECC) and the Youth Education Centre (YEC) by participating on parent committees, and as ambassadors and helping to lead the family related activities of our festivals. Attending Tot Shabbat on Fridays and Family Services on Saturdays is a great way for parents and grandparents to celebrate Shabbat and socialize. It's gratifying to see that some activities that my partner and I did with our children are still relevant. And there is always room for new traditions to create and sustain a warm and welcoming community where we all feel that we belong. Please reach out to our clergy, professional staff or lay leadership with your ideas, and to volunteer in creating and leading our Holy Blossom community.

SACRED ACTION AT HOLY BLOSSOM TEMPLE

In Sifrei Devarim, our sages asked "How is it possible to cleave to God?" Can one ascend the heights of heaven? Instead, they reply, cleave to the sacred action and the attributes of God you hold most dear. Be kind as God is kind, be generous as God is generous, and be patient as God is patient. In doing so, you will find that you are very close to God indeed. Sacred action at Holy Blossom Temple comes in so many forms and ways, but in this bulletin, it's a pleasure to highlight two actions that our community has taken to care for the stranger. Sometimes that person comes to us from far away, drawn by friends and our good name, and finds a new home for themselves in the process. Other times we are simply acting out of love and channeling the act of generosity. Giving and

supporting those whom we will never see or meet; but who need us just the same.

Growing up in the Jewish community of Istanbul, our community numbered around 20,000 when I had my Bar Mitzvah and it was very close knit. One where almost everybody knew everybody and supported each other. The Jewish youth clubs were important places where we were taught about our religion, and then taken on a tour of Israel. For two weeks we would travel to see the holy sites, as well as to visit Israel from Tiberias to Eilat, to understand our roots and where we have come from.

Sadly, due to the many wars in the last few years, our region is no longer as friendly a place for Jews as when I was growing up. When my wife became pregnant, we decided to come to Toronto for the birth. We knew that there was a very large and very welcoming Jewish community. We wanted our child to become Canadian so that he would always have the option to come to Canada in the future to live.

It was a very nice surprise to find out that my childhood friend Axel Goldenberg had already been living here for 3 years. Axel assisted us in every way during our stay in Toronto. I told him that I wanted to be a part of a synagogue here, and when I asked him to introduce me to his synagogue, he told me about Holy Blossom. He said he was very happy to be a part of its community and that Holy Blossom received him with affection and made him and his family right at home.

I felt the same way the day I visited Holy Blossom and met with Rabbi Kaye who told me about this special place. He explained that my entire family could be part of this community, and it was a place where they would love to have us. He also organized the bris for our son, Jeremi, and we were delighted to have the beautiful ceremony at the Holy Blossom 8 days after my son was born.

I had talked with Rabbi McCarroll on the phone before the bris where she told me about the ceremony and the proceedings. Then, when we met her in the morning, she told us all about how the ceremony would take place. She introduced us to the congregation, and we immediately felt that we were already a part of the Holy Blossom community. Rabbi McCarroll also invited me to read a passage from the Torah during the morning prayer, which I was delighted to do.

Being a part of the minyan on Monday morning was amazing. We truly felt the embrace of the Jewish community so far from home. I am overjoyed to see my son enter the covenant of the Jewish people knowing that we will raise him as a Jew. Just like me, just like how my family raised me, where I have embraced all the teachings of my religion, culture and traditions all my life, and being Jewish has always made me proud.

I can't wait to bring my son Jeremi to Mikveh knowing that we have a Jewish home in Toronto. Holy Blossom will always be special to me because it is where Jeremi has taken the first steps toward becoming a part of the Jewish people. I know that this place will always welcome him with affection, compassion and open arms.

I know that it is many years away, but we also want Jeremi to have his Bar Mitzvah at Holy Blossom!



STOCKING THE PANTRIES

Starting in the early summer a group of volunteers, including myself, agreed to stock the "little pantries" that are set up on Dewbourne Avenue just near the parking lot.

The reason I decided to volunteer is that I am troubled by what I hear being reported in the news regarding so many families and people experiencing food insecurity. I think that it must be very terrifying for people to wonder and worry "How will I manage to feed my family and myself?" I realized that being able to plan some tasty meals and buy all the ingredients was not so easy for many people.

I usually go to a supermarket and pick up some nutritious food the day before I am scheduled to stock the pantry. I try to see what is on sale and what is safe to leave in a pantry. Let me be clear, what is in the little pantry is retrieved very quickly by people who are in need of it. One time, I left a dozen eggs on a very hot summer's day. I went back an hour later, and they were gone.

I have met a few lovely people on some occasions when I am replenishing the pantries. One lady said she thought she would find

an interesting book as the pantries do resemble the little libraries that can be found all over our city. She shyly told me that she was so relieved to find food in the pantry as she had very little food in her house. She was hesitant but I encouraged her to take what she needed.

It is an easy task to pick a day every week and decide to help with stocking. There is food brought by congregants that is in the Janis Rotman Tzedakah Centre just inside the Ava Road doors. I check there and collect some items, then I add my few items and make my way to the Pantries on Dewbourne and fill the shelves. I am hoping what is in the pantry will be a nice surprise and bring comfort to whoever needs it. As I say the shelves are emptied very quickly. This is both sad and an indication of such need, but good that the need can be met in a small way.

I encourage everyone to bring non-perishable items to Temple if they are attending services, a lecture, a course or just passing by. Your donation will have an impact on people who live in the surrounding area by giving them the means to put a meal on the table for themselves and their family.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE TO CARE: KUGEL KINDNESS AT HBT

To date, the amazing team of volunteers has baked about 36 kugels, led by Sandi Smith. She has done an incredible job of organizing dates, times, and ingredients, and has pulled the team together with enthusiasm and dedication. Sandi runs a tight ship and is deeply grateful to her volunteers: Bambi Katz, Anne Freeman, Debra Merowitz, Nada Simon-Hara, Susan Bookbinder, Miriam Kreiger, Michael Ryval, and Audrey Birenbaum.

It has been a fantastic bonding experience for the kugel makers, too, many of whom have brought their expert skills into the Mishkan kitchen and are working hard to perfect the recipe and baking procedures. In fact, we have even engaged new members, and look forward to welcoming Audrey Birenbaum, who is new to Holy Blossom, as she comes on board to coordinate the delivery side of the initiative, after having such a wonderful time getting to know her fellow volunteers.

As another volunteer baker writes:

"To date I have had three opportunities to make kugels for the new initiative Kugel Kindness. This has been a great experience to be able to participate in a worthwhile cause. I look forward to continuing to be part of this amazing initiative."

THE BIRTH OF A NEW ORGANIZATION

In Judaism, we value the idea of community in multiple ways. We require a minyan of 10 people to say our prayers. We celebrate Brit Milah, baby namings, B'nei Mitzvah and weddings in community and we are stronger when we are supported by others.

As a Reform congregation, we connect with community by being part of Reform Jewish Communities of Canada and more broadly, the Union for Reform Judaism. As clergy, we are also part of larger organizations within our movement. Rabbis are members of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and Cantors and Cantorial Soloists are members of the American Conference of Cantors and Guild of Temple Musicians respectively. I have been blessed to be a member of the American Conference of Cantors for the past 20 years and a member of the Executive Board for the past 14 years. In my years on the Executive Board, I have served in various roles and currently serve as the Chair of the Ethics Committee. This is work that I take very seriously, and ethics practices have come forefront to many organizations in recent years.

It is important that these organizations exist as they not only support their membership but also help to build continuity, integrity, and strength for our movement. Since I moved back to Toronto in 2020, one of the things I have missed about my last community is a local Reform cantors network. It is one thing to see my colleagues at a convention or a Board meeting 1-2 times a year or monthly on Zoom and it is another to work together in making a difference in your local Reform community. This is something that did not exist in Canada until now.... And so, it is with great pride that I decided to take matters into my own hands, and with the support of Canadian Colleagues, launch the RCCC or Reform Cantors and Cantorial Soloists of Canada. After a few meetings I am pleased to tell you that we have representation from Reform communities across the country and we will be producing our first initiative on Thursday, April 20th as Holy Blossom will host our inaugural concert. With 16 participants, we will be raising money to both help bolster our new association and to also raise money for Israel's 75th birthday by supporting the IMPJ or Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism. The time has never been so important for such a cause, and we will be partnering with the IMPJ in their International outreach campaign that was launched this month.

I hope that all of you will consider attending this historic concert happening at Holy Blossom Temple on April 20th. Aside from being an evening of wonderful music and celebration, we will be raising money for a most urgent cause. The concert will also be our final concert for the season, as part of our Musical Heritage Series.

THE JOURNEY THROUGH THE YEC...

...At five years of age the study of Scripture; At ten the study of Mishnah; At thirteen subject to the commandments; At fifteen the study of Talmud; ... Pirkei Avot 5:21

Our tradition creates a natural educational journey for our children to follow, offering milestones

that allow us to mark their growth, and celebrate their achievements along the way. Our Youth Education Centre is built around this framework and takes pride in preparing our students for these life cycle events, and celebrating with families along the way. One need only look in the back stairwell at our Confirmation and Consecration Wall of Fame to see the rich tradition these life cycle events have and the importance they continue to play in the growth and education of our children.

One's Jewish educational journey begins with Consecration in Grade 1. Consecration marks the start of one's formal Jewish education and is acknowledged with the receiving of a miniature Torah – literally the gift of Torah. The YEC prepares consecrands and their parents, who learn all about what makes the Torah special, how we honour the Torah, and they make their own Aron Hakodesh for their Torah to rest in at home. Parents enclose a special blessing for their children. It is a moment that the congregation as a whole celebrates with these young families.

Jessica Cooper's son Miles was a member of this year's Consecration class and shares:

It was so special to see Miles participate in the consecration



ceremony at Holy Blossom, to come full circle from my own childhood consecration ceremony. Before the ceremony, we were able to make an ark and inscribe it with the same inscription my parents had written to me before my ceremony. The building and the community have come such a long way, but in many respects Holy Blossom is the same place I grew up with. And it's so gratifying to see our kids embrace the Holy Blossom space, ceremonies and programming.

During the formative years between Consecration and Confirmation, students in the YEC reach many milestones as they make their way to B'nei Mitzvah, and then beyond. Siyyum Hasefer to mark the learning of the Aleph Bet; buying snack at breaktime; attending YEAH activities; being Shaliach B'Tzibur in weekly T'fillah; Grade 4 Israel projects; graduating to Monday night classes; grade 6/7 retreat; entering HABSTY, and so many more.

Halfway through one's high school career Confirmation looks and feels like a graduation, but is also a significant milestone that represents a teen's affirmation and commitment to their own Jewish life. Our Confirmation students are the pride and joy of the YEC. Making the choice and commitment to continue involvement in regular Jewish studies, these teens learn with members of our clergy team, and other leaders and teachers in the congregation, giving them a wide scope of themes and topics. Confirmation students become natural leaders in the YEC, serving as Madrichim in our younger grades, and often leading special events and activities for the rest of the Monday night 'teen scene.' The entire congregation shares their pride with families on Confirmation day, when the students take the bimah and lead part of the service.

Carly Steinman, a current Confirmation parent, and a



past confirmand herself reflects on this meaningful life cycle moment:

When I was confirmed, as the 2023 Holy Blossom class will experience this spring, we had a private service with the rabbi



and participated in the congregational Shavuot service. I loved that my class was celebrating this lifecycle event together as a group, after years of Hebrew school together, rather than individually as it was for our b'nai mitzvah.

What I especially recall is the rabbi gave us each an individual blessing on the bima at the private service. He told me he hoped I would be a rabbi, that Judaism would continue to be part of my life, and 15-year old me wrote in my diary, "And I know it will'.

My Confirmation diary entry concludes: 'I felt very proud to be a Jew today, for my friends to see me, and my family. (Mom cried behind her sunglasses).

My oldest child is part of the 2023 Holy Blossom Confirmation class, and I will be crying behind my sunglasses. To this wonderful group of teens, as you reach this season and beyond, may you continue to grow and learn together as members of our shul and your communities, and let us say, Amen.

After my Dad passed, I became dispirited and disinterested. For many years afterwards I seemed to be shulshopping for a place that could feel like

a good fit. Then I had a son, Asher. His eyes sparkle like my Dad's when he smiles.

One Saturday a friend of mine invited me to join her for a service at Holy Blossom Temple. I hadn't been back in twenty years. The building has changed. I've changed. But the sanctuary is the same. During the service my mind wandered back to years ago. I thought about my Dad, as my son leaned against me the same way I used to do to him. It was very emotional for me, and I didn't know if I wanted that.

As we walked out into the atrium, I watched Asher run around with a friend he had only just met. Then I saw old friends of mine. Rabbi Splansky approached us and with a smile like a warm embrace, she said, "Welcome." From that moment, I felt like I belonged somewhere. I was amongst friends. No longer nostalgic, but present.

I immediately re-registered myself as a member and enrolled Asher in the Holy Blossom religious school. He loves it the activities and interactions. He's not bored. He's made friends, and he wants to be there. That's a big deal. On the long car rides home, Asher enthusiastically shares with me that he's learning about his parsha, and that he's having fun and becoming more confident in knowing what it means to be Jewish. "There's a lot going on for us kids," he tells me. I love that. What more could I ask for my son's enrollment and participation in a religious school program.

For me, I've never felt more of a sense of community than I do now at Holy Blossom. For each holiday, major and minor, I can count on Holy Blossom Temple to provide the sense of Jewishness that I've always wanted. The sense of inclusion I feel, the values Asher is being taught, the Channukah choir in which he participated and the "Latka Bar"—which was a brilliant idea (who ever heard of putting peanut butter on a latka?!) The staff at Holy Blossom seem to do a lot to bring members together, and I'm truly grateful for that. More than a place to go, it's a place to be.

SHINSHINIM: BRINGING ISRAEL TO LIFE

My name is Ella Payorski, and I am the UJA Shinshinit this year at Holy Blossom Temple. The UJA Shinshinim program was established 16 years ago to strengthen ties between the Toronto Jewish community and the State of Israel. Young Israelis such as myself, 18-year-olds who just graduated from high school in Israel, do a year of volunteer service in Toronto's Jewish community.

We work in a variety of Jewish institutions around the GTA, establishing stronger connections to Israel within the community through a variety of activities and programs. Being assigned to the Holy Blossom community makes me feel very fortunate.

Here at Holy Blossom, I work with people of all ages. I place a high priority on personal connections with children, youth and families. I can see the impact it has on the connection to Israel.

On Sundays, I help with activities for all ages at the YEC, and on Mondays, I run activities for B'nei Mitzvah, JTEM, and Confirmation students, and I'm involved with HABSTY too. I also share D'var Israel at the Shabbat family and main sanctuary services, as well as break-out activities for kids.

During YEC on Sunday mornings, my main goal is to do fun and meaningful activities with students. I work with kindergarten to grade 5 classes, and I love spending time with them. My activities with the children are based on my own connections to Israel. For example, I did an activity with grade 3 about the Moshavs in Israel, as I grew up in moshav Kfar Monash myself. In addition, it is a shinshinim tradition to announce a new Hebrew word every Sunday morning during t'filah, which is something the kids really enjoy, and it is a great way to engage them in Hebrew and Israel.

On Monday nights I am with teenagers, from grade 6 and up. Because the teenagers are close to my age, I enjoy spending time with them, relating to them on a personal level, and doing activities with deep meaning.

I started an Israel elective program with the JTEM and Confirmation teens, revolving around 'What is it like to be a teenager in Israel?' Our discussion topics included Israeli food and music, as seen from the perspective of an Israeli teen. Every Monday night I'm also involved with the HABSTY youth group, having fun and getting to know the teens personally, and I also join NFTY events with them.

My experience with the congregation has been so great, and I am looking forward to having fun until the end of my year of service. Getting to know families in the congregation, and building relationships with them make me feel more connected to the community, and taking part in these amazing activities is something I really enjoy.
