### **RABBINIC REFLECTION**



How to Live in the Middle of the Story

We are in the middle of the Chanukah-Purim-Pesach stretch of our calendar. While each is entirely unique, all three holidays share the well-known pattern of: "They tried to kill us, we survived, let's eat." Each of those holidays is a celebration

with joy and light, because we already know about the happy ending, but what do we know about the middle? The rededication of Jerusalem's Temple didn't come easily. The Maccabean Revolt to win back sovereignty over the Land of Israel took seven years (167-160 BCE)! Even the fantastical and fictional story of Purim does not pretend that triumph comes quickly. Set against the backdrop of Persia in the 4th century BCE, from the time of the ascent of the dangerously irresponsible King Achashverosh to the execution of the genocidal vizier Haman, thirteen years had passed! And while there is little extra-Biblical evidence of the Pesach story, according to the Torah's account, before the plagues, before the Israelite uprising against Pharoah and their taskmasters, before the miraculous crossing of the sea to freedom, we suffered 430 years of slavery in Egypt!

We celebrate the triumphant end of the stories with festive songs and feasts, but now is the time we need to study the hard middle of these stories, because God knows, WE are in the middle of our own hard story. We must study the courage of the Maccabean soldiers and the military strategies which led to "the few defeating the many." We must study the politically astute strategies of Esther and Mordechai, who knew how to use soft power to protect their people from surprisingly swift and widespread antisemitism. And we must study the resilience of our ancestors in Egypt who were able to maintain their distinct identity, their faith, and their human dignity throughout four generations of being treated as slaves, as less than human. Each one of these holidays serve to inspire and guide us in the here and now, as WE write the next chapter of Jewish history.

With the minute-by-minute news cycle of today, we have become terribly impatient. We have been trained in the age of technology to have an average span of attention that last all of 8.25 seconds. But we must train up now in how to "hold the pose," even when we feel the strain, because we are only five months into this trying time. God willing, it will not be years or generations before we see our way through to freedom and light on the other side, but in the meantime, we need to protect ourselves from depression and despair.

We do that best by celebrating models of courage. Holy Blossom is proud of our congregants who are each using their skills and their networks to create opportunities to set things right. Whether in their professional settings, on campus, advocating before elected officials, on social and traditional media, or volunteering in Israel, everyone is finding a way to do their part in protecting the Jewish People from harm and hatred.

We do that best by organizing. Holy Blossom has now established a new Advocacy Committee to tap into the best organizational resources and curate a steady series of action items for our congregants.

We do that best by simply being together. Whether for prayer or learning, whether for planned or spontaneous gathering, just being together at Holy Blossom helps. Here we do not need to explain or defend. Here our stories are heard and understood. Here we remember who we are, where we come from, what we stand for, and to Whom we belong. Here our efforts are reinforced and multiplied. Here our fears are softened, and our prayers uplifted. Here we feel a part of something important and enduring, the next link in a very long and very strong chain.

### A Prayer for the Middle

I have recently returned from my second trip to Israel since October 7th. In Israel, everyone is acutely aware that we are only in the middle of this brutal war. What is the prayer for the middle?

We say *Shehechiyanu* at the beginning – when eating new fruit of the season, wearing a new piece of clothing, dedicating a new house or a new baby, entering a new year. We *bench gomel* at the end – when returning home after a long journey, when surviving a near miss or bringing some struggle to resolution. But what is the *brachah* for living life in the thick of it, as we are now and will likely be for some time? It is the *Hashkiveinu* prayer, the prayer for protection when night falls and shadows loom.

For You are gracious and merciful. Guard our going and our coming, so that we will know life and peace evermore. Blessed are You, O God, Guardian of Your People Israel for all time.

### FROM THE PRESIDENT

One of our key themes at Holy Blossom Temple is Belonging. Last year I spoke and wrote about three stages of belonging - being noticed, being named and being known which lead to a greater sense of belonging. This applies to any community that you

may be a part of. In the last few years, including the last five months, the need for the support of a community has grown significantly. I'll share how three key communities that I'm a member of have supported me through these crazy few years!

But first, let's define what a community is. A community generally involves people who share values, beliefs and/or goals. It may inspire people, provide emotional support, help or advice, and potentially reduce stress and the sense of isolation. Interactions with the community may be in person or online or potentially both. Helen Keller summarized some of the benefits of belonging to a community, "Alone we can do so little, together we can do so much." In a community you feel connected to others, we are not alone in our struggles and are part of something larger than ourselves.

I belong to a few communities in Toronto and in Israel and wanted to share with you how they have helped me cope with COVID and the ongoing war with Hamas. The first community that I belong to is Holy Blossom Temple. When I first joined HBT, I admit that I was overwhelmed by the plethora of activities – services, lectures, programs for members of all ages. I certainly never thought that I'd join the Temple's leadership. As a young thirty-something parent, I doubt I even knew what a Board of Directors was! Since my husband Jeff's family had been members for two generations, I assumed that I would somehow find my own way into this community of communities.

We found our first mini HBT community with fellow parents of young children. We attended family services, participated in kid-friendly programming, and social gatherings at Temple, at parks and skating rinks and each other's homes. While we do not focus our involvement at HBT around our children anymore, we continue to socialize with those HBT friends with whom we shared common values and goals and continue to provide support and advice to each other as we all move through our lives.

There are multiple other mini communities at Holy Blossom to which I belonged in the past and/or continue to belong. For example, Women of Holy Blossom, High Holy Day and Shabbat Gabbaim, as well as a more fluid group of HBT leaders, some of whom have served the Temple as leaders of various programs, and functions and some have gone on to lead the Reform movement in Toronto, Canada and around the world. I share values, beliefs, and goals with members of all these Holy Blossom communities and have received much support, advice and have formed deep friendships that will continue to support me.

Holy Blossom is blessed with many mini communities, and I've seen how our members have supported one another, and have blossomed together. With so many new Temple members, new communities are also sprouting up and others are being reinforced with new ideas and new members. You can feel the excitement in the air.

I have another community that I belong to where I feel known. I have been active in the Reform movement as a general HBT member attending large Biennial gatherings across North America as well as a Board member of the URJ North American Board for over 20 years. I have met many fellow members of the Reform community, including members of the Israeli Reform movement.

In early December I met with Israeli colleagues who were on their way to a URJ meeting in Washington DC, that I was also attending, then met up with a few other Israeli Reform leaders in Israel a few weeks later. The North Americans were worried about the Israelis and the Gaza war, and the Israelis were worried about us and antisemitism in the Diaspora.

We share common values, beliefs, and goals, support each other through personal challenges, and rejoice with them at simchas. We enjoy our infrequent but in-depth visits together at conferences and board meetings, or personal visits. Time may pass between visits but when we meet up, it feels like only yesterday.

What communities do you belong to? What communities are you looking for? With over 1800 members at Holy Blossom, I am sure that you will find others with whom you share values and beliefs, and over time will find inspiration and support. We are stronger together. ### AM YISRAEL CHAI

In December, Canada's Rally for the Jewish People was held in Ottawa. Thousands of Jews and allies from across the country came to the capitol so that we could make our voices heard. We were calling for a release of the hostages taken on October 7th, stronger stands from our government against the growing stain of antisemitism in our country, and for continued committed support from Canada in Israel's war against Hamas.

More than 75 members of Holy Blossom Temple let us know that they were committed to making the trip, and hundreds more tuning in online. 57 travelers had signed up to take a bus, leaving early in the morning from Thornhill, that would bring them directly to the rally in Ottawa.

Things did not go as planned. This already unstable world went sideways again as many buses simply never showed up to ferry their passengers to Ottawa. After months of investigation, it seems more likely than ever that it was part of an antisemitic attempt to silence the voice of the Jewish community.

Holy Blossom Temple member Emma Wakelin, who was at the muster point before dawn and made the trip despite it all, wrote the following letter to Rabbi Splansky upon her return from Ottawa.



Dear Rabbi,

7 am in the freezing cold of a dark mall parking lot is a strange place to find pride in community.

As you are well aware, bus #32, which was to carry Holy Blossom congregants to Ottawa was among the 17 buses that never arrived.

Despite the cold, both the early morning wind that was blowing in that parking lot and the coffee that we had trying to jolt us awake, there was nothing but resolve and togetherness amongst the 50 or so Holy Blossom folks. There were no "I am just going to go home" or "I have had enough of this," there was only a common feeling that we were not going to stop anyone from letting us get to Ottawa to give voice to the hostages and to draw a line in the sand to the antisemitism rising in Canada.

- It was beautiful.
- 2 people going on this bus.
- 4 people going on that bus.
- a dozen or so climbing into SUVs not sure how they would get home.
- and most beautifully, the clergy and leaders of our temple remained calm and ensured that every one of their people were taken care of.

The last HBT folks that left that parking lot (indeed were among the last of thousands of people who were there that morning) were the rabbis, cantors, and lay leaders of Holy Blossom.

You would have been proud I am sure. I know I sure as heck was.

I (along with Kelly Baron) drove rabbis Kaye and Baruchel to Ottawa and back, and despite the clear antisemitic ploy to demoralize us and prevent us from displaying our Jewish pride on the grounds of our Parliament, there was only joy.We sang songs, told stories and even did some studying.

I am so proud to be part of this community. I am proud of the leaders of our community and I just wanted to share my gratitude with you.

### MEANINGFUL TRADITIONS: FAMILY SHABBAT

There's a fascinating teaching, from Pirkei Avot, that reads as follows:

"Ten things were created on the eve of the Sabbath at twilight, and these are they: [1] the mouth of the earth, [2] the mouth of the well, [3] the mouth of the donkey, [4] the rainbow, [5] the manna, [6] the staff [of Moses], [7] the shamir (a worm), [8] the letters, [9] the writing, [10] and the tablets. And some say: also the demons, the grave of Moses, and the ram of Abraham, our father. And some say: and also tongs, made with tongs." (Pirkei Avot 5:6)

In other words, Shabbat is a time of rest, where we can put down the work of the week and enjoy that palace of time and space in which we are rooted in the stories and songs of our Jewish tradition.

Yet, to arrive at Shabbat, it in fact takes a lot of hard work for it to be that fully restful and meaningful time of week that we aspire to. This is exactly what we aim for at Family Services, our Shabbat Morning experience for our HBT families of all ages and stages.

As described by HBT members Maddie Axelrod, David Kogan, and their family:

"The Saturdays when we get to come to Family Services at Holy Blossom are really special for our family. It's an opportunity for us to all make time to be together, across generations, stepping away from the usual hustle and bustle of our busy lives. When I step into the Youth Chapel with my daughters, we look at the quilted tapestries and try to find the square I made when I was a kid and my parents brought me to shul. Continuing these traditions with other families, new and old members of our congregation, creates memories that bring us closer as a family and keep us rooted in our community values."

As we seek to strengthen our Family Services, we recognise that Shabbat also takes creativity, as we look at the components which make it engaging and meaningful to our regular attendees, and which can welcome in our next generation as well.

We also recognise that it takes deep reflection, so that our families can partake in meaningful moments together and make memories which will last them a lifetime.






### MOMENTS OF JOY IN THE YEC!

When my 3 year old Israeli grandson Adam came to Canada for a respite in early October, together with his 5 year old sister and their mother, but without their dad, doing Miluim in Search and Rescue within Israel, we didn't know what to expect. How to build a routine, to make them feel secure? Although they both spoke English, it was clearly a second language. And the culture of Israel, warm, uninhibited, with many fewer boundaries, is not Canadian.

Within a day of arriving, Adam had been accepted into Holy Blossom preschool, and he began to attend within a week. With the kindness that I now see is characteristic of the ECC, he was put in a kita with an Israeli Ganenet – not only for the language but also for the cultural understanding. And he was embraced in every way.

Three year olds are such wonderful little people. They live in the moment, joyfully, openly. Adam loved it all, from the security guard (now one of his friends!) to the policemen, to the kids in his kita and all of the kids in the ECC. He loved the teachers, he loved Wendy. And within a few days he loved them all in English.

He sang Canadian children's songs around our house. He was excited about Halloween and thrilled about Chanukah (we all learned so many English Chanukah songs!). Trucks are a universal language and he played with them at school and at his friends' homes.

He and his sister put blue stars on the wall in the Schwartz/Reisman Atrium for their Israeli grandparents and their dad.

One rainy morning he decided to hug every single child as they came into the building. I saw it as his way of reflecting the irreplaceable hug he had experienced, the warm embrace of Holy Blossom Temple.

### ISRAELIS ABROAD AND HOLY BLOSSOM

Our love story with Holy Blossom Temple began six years ago, soon after coming to Toronto from Israel for Anna's studies. We arrived right before the High Holidays and realized that if we wanted to feel festive, that would mean going to services, which is not the case in Israel. From the moment we stepped into Holy Blossom Temple, we felt like home. We came on Yom Kippur eve and were amazed that the main sermon delivered by the rabbi dealt with Israel. That bond, which we first became familiar with that evening, continued to deepen. A few years have elapsed since then, and for a number of them, I (Lior), coordinated the activities of the YAD young adults group, Anna worked as a foundation associate, and our son, Avshalom, fit right in at Tot Shabbat.



But this year, a new kind of magic occurred. Rabbi Yael Splansky, like all her trailblazing women leaders, saw an opportunity to fulfill an old dream. And during a conversation we had at a conference in New York, which I came to wearing my regular hat, but also that of North America Regional Director of the Department of Irgoon and Israelis Abroad at the World Zionist Organization, we sensed a connection that was brimming with potential. By joining forces with the Department, headed by Gusti Braverman Yehoshua who represents the Reform Movement at the national institutions in Israel, as well as the Canadian Zionist Federation leading by Les Rothschild, we identified a vision that could be achieved – namely, integrating the Israeli community into Holy Blossom Temple.

And, in fact, we have implemented a number of collaborations since the beginning of the year. The first was a Ne'ilah service for Israelis at Holy Blossom Temple. Over 200 Israelis attended the event, and for most of them, it was the first time that they ever took part in an egalitarian service – where the entire family sits together, where a woman carries the Torah and, last but not least, where the Havdalah ceremony that follows it is conducted by a female rabbi.

Following the horrific events of last October, Rabbi Splansky, together with the synagogue's incredible staff, embraced us and displayed a desire to extend assistance and support and be at our side – and most of all, to open Holy Blossom's doors and make it a BAIT, a home for the Israeli community.

Furthermore, we had an Israeli Kabbalat Shabbat to commemorate the first 30 days that had passed since the October events. And this month, we opened a special track for Israelis in the Israeli Shnat Mitzvah program. We also held a Shabbat Shira and Tu Bishvat celebrations as part of a peak event attended by both communities in the congregation, led by Rabbi Splansky and Cantor Rosen.

Alongside Holy Blossom's dedicated staff, headed by the Executive Director Rachel Malach, Cantorial Soloist Lindi Rivers, and Iris Spitz, the Department's program manager, Yahav Barnea, and in collaboration with JNF-Canada - we all stood on the bimah together with the Israeli musicians, Amit Rozenblum and Tal Katz, and





enjoyed a joint Israeli-Canadian Kabbalat Shabbat. We concluded with a Shabbat dinner that lasted late into the night, and no one wanted to go home.

For me, to stand on the synagogue's bimah with my rabbi and my cantor, and serve as a 'Shaliach Tzibur' (public emissary) at all these events, was extremely moving.

This Kabbalat Shabbat was truly something special, and it's been on my mind and in my soul ever since. The positive atmosphere, the genuine smiles, the eye contact, and the overall togetherness left a lasting impact and provided muchneeded strength.

Rabbi Splansky's leadership, both in her clergy role and as a person, is inspiring and boundary-breaking. I'm proud to be part of this community, and appreciate the opportunity to stand side as a partner, embracing my identity as a Jew and an Israeli in Canada with HBT support.



The positive feedback we've received is encouraging, and I look forward to our continued success in identifying meaningful events and projects and connecting with wonderful people around us.
