Talking points while speaking to Members of Parliament regarding the upcoming NDP resolution on Israel and Gaza.

- The NDP will be bringing forward a motion in the House of Commons on March 18th that threatens Canada's values, foreign policy, and support for Israel, while rewarding Hamas with recognition following its murderous attack on Israel on October 7th.
- The motion calls for Canada's immediate and unilateral recognition of a Palestinian State, contrary to longstanding Canadian policy that calls for a "...Palestinian State, as part of a comprehensive, just and lasting peace settlement." Foregoing bilateral negotiations between Israel and the Palestinian Authority will leave critical issues unresolved, including borders, the status of Jerusalem and Palestinian refugees.
- International law has traditionally required that four criteria be satisfied before recognition of an entity as an independent sovereign state can be considered:
- 1. The entity must exercise effective and independent governmental control.
- 2. The entity must possess a defined territory over which it exercises such control.
- 3. The entity must have the capacity to freely engage in foreign relations.
- 4. There must be effective and independent governmental control over a permanent population.
- Because the West Bank and Gaza are physically and politically divided between Hamas and the Palestinian Authority, and, because there are no recognized boundaries between Israel and the West Bank, except for the <u>demarcation line</u> set out in the <u>1949 Armistice Agreements</u> between the armies of <u>Israel</u> and those of its neighbours, Palestinians do not meet criteria 1, 2, or 4.
- Unilateral recognition would accord *de facto* recognition of Hamas, a Canadian-listed terrorist organization, as the government of Gaza.
- The motion also calls on the government to reinstate funding to UNRWA, ignoring evidence of UNRWA's role in perpetuating the conflict. Unfortunately, reinstated funding may already be coming, despite revelations about UNRWA employees collaborating with Hamas during the October 7 attacks.
- The motion will also ask for an arms embargo on Israel at a time when Canada's ally is fighting a defensive war against a terrorist organization that has sworn to destroy the Jewish state. This would be akin to enacting an arms embargo against Ukraine as it battles Russia's invasion.
- To end the suffering in this conflict, Hamas as the Canadian government has reiterated several times must liberate the hostages, lay down its arms, and play no future role in governing Gaza.
- Hamas has rejected multiple negotiated offers to provide additional assistance to Palestinians and for a ceasefire between the parties.
- We hope to see an eventual, negotiated two-state solution between Palestinians and Israelis that brings about long-term peace. These policies are nonpartisan and reflect Canada's longstanding tradition of promoting peace and supporting liberal democracies around the world.
- The NDP's motion is inconsistent with these values and poses a direct threat to Canada's longstanding foreign policy.
- An unclear, un-nuanced, one-sided, and divisive motion should not be allowed to change Canada's longstanding foreign policy. There are far better ways to change foreign policy, including a study on the subject currently on the agenda in the House of Commons Foreign Affairs Committee.
- The Motion risks fueling divisions between the Muslim and Jewish communities in Canada.
- With regard to moving forward toward statehood for Palestinians, Canadian MPs should not be swayed by a
 motion calling for unilateral recognition but rather urge Palestinian leadership to return to the negotiating table
 with Israel. This bilateral response is mandated by the Oslo Accords and is in fact the only way to ensure genuine
 peace in the region. Unilateral measures have never brought peace and stability and will not do so now for
 either Israelis or Palestinians. We therefore urge MPs to vote against this motion.
