RABBINIC REFLECTION

Make Way! Make Way!

This Temple bulletin is filled with proud reflections over the year past and joyful anticipations for the year ahead of us. I am in awe of how our Holy

Blossom Temple team of professionals and lay leaders has worked tirelessly and intuitively to meet the moment of 5784. Since October 7th, our sacred mandate has taken on many new and complex dimensions. Organizing rallies, raising emergency funding, cultivating interfaith relationships, advocating for Israel and Jewish Canadians, creating new curricula for young and adult learners, providing for local Israeli families, revisiting our security systems and protocols, meeting with elected officials, answering calls from the media, and most significantly, supporting the emotional and spiritual needs of congregants who are, to varying degrees, impacted by the assault of October 7th and its aftershocks. All this, in addition to the routine work of running a vibrant and aspiring congregation.

Because I am protective of our community, I am furious that Canadian Jewish life has been so abruptly upended and at the same time, I am extraordinarily proud to see how many congregants – across the life stages – are stepping up to play leading roles in their schools, campuses and workplaces, in volunteerism, and in generosity. I am not at all surprised, but I am very moved to see how our people are devoting their unique talents to meet the trials of our time.

Most years, we approach the new year with joyful anticipation and curiosity. Normally, we are energized by the thought of turning the page to greet a new year of possibility and promise. This year, however, it seems many are approaching the new year with trepidation. It's understandable. What will we have to face? What hard truths will we have to witness? What burdens will we have to carry? How will we protect the next generation from hardship? Who will stand with us? What will become of the Canada we love? What will become of the Israel we love?

In Hebrew, the High Holy Days are called "Yamim Noraim." This can be translated as Days of Awe or even, the Days of Dread. That trepidation before the unknown is exactly what Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur are designed to address. We do not pretend it

away. Instead, we name it, we ritualize it, we make it sacred. Most importantly, we do so TOGETHER. Many have described experiences of a new kind of loneliness this year. Some have lost friends. Some relationships with family members have cooled. Some feel isolated or misunderstood by work colleagues. So we congregate, where we know we belong. We feel a magnetic pull towards the synagogue, where our stories intermingle with ease and we take sanctuary in one another. Bring your innermost prayers and they will be elevated and reinforced by the prayers of fellow congregants. Bring your worries and they will be tempered by newfound confidence in the never-ending story of the Jewish People. Bring your intentions for the new year and they will be met by good and capable partners, because we each have a role to play now. And bring your song. It will be made more beautiful and more powerful, when it is woven together with the voices of hundreds more.

In Sephardic Machzorim (High Holy Day prayerbooks), there is a medieval liturgical poem for Rosh HaShanah. It is called "Achot Ketanah, Little Sister." Its refrain echoes the words of the Talmudic Sage, Rabbi Abaye, who prayed: "May the year come to an end, and with it, its curses." In the final stanza, however, the poem adds another prayer: "And may the new year begin and with it, its blessings." "Tichleh Shana v'Kililoteha. Tachel Shana u'Virchoteha!"

Excerpt from "Little Sister,"

by Rabbi Avraham Chazan Gerundi, 13th-century Spain

The little sister,

her prayers she arranges, and her praises she recites.

Please, God, heal what ails her now.

May the year and its curses come to an end.

With pleasant words she calls out to You and with song and praises that befit You. Until when will You hide Your eyes? May the year and its curses come to an end!

...Be strong and rejoice,

And you shall ascend to Zion.

God shall declare:

"Make way! Make way! Clear her paths."

May the New Year and its blessings begin!

So may it be for us. *L'Shanah Tovah*. I wish you and those you love a year of abundant blessings. For Israel and the Jewish People everywhere may it be a year of peace.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

It feels as if we have been given a few extra weeks of summer this year but I'm not complaining. Like Holy Blossom Temple professional staff and clergy, I have a few items

on my plate that I planned to accomplish over the summer.

Fortunately, my deadlines are self-imposed and flexible, and I have been able to carve out some time to sit on a cousin's dock in the Laurentians and to drive to New Hampshire to see friends with my husband Jeff. Lounging on a dock, and long drives are the perfect time to be introspective, in my case to think about the High Holy Days and how quickly my two-year term as President has gone by. When I first introduced myself formally to the congregation as president in December 2022, I spoke about our updated strategic plan, our plans to commence its implementation, and our continuing focus on our members – welcoming everyone back to our home at 1950 Bathurst Street and increasing their feeling of belonging. Those plans are all in progress, and we have done more.

In May 2023 we celebrated Rabbi Splansky's 25th year as *our* Rabbi, and as our rabbi. We kicked off our year of celebration with a multi-generational party that included a shuk filled with artwork made by our students, klezmer music, Israeli dancing, and many words of tribute. We welcomed back our members with a joyous celebration. Through the generous donations in Rabbi Splansky's honour, we were able to hire a Director of Outreach and Next Gen Engagement (Rabbi Taylor Baruchel) to support our young families and young adults and to reach out to those not-yet members, with a warm welcome and connection to our Membership Department. Over the past 3 years, we have grown over 20%. One in five member households is new to Holy Blossom. Life is definitely blossoming here.

While not as exciting as our growth in membership, I am very proud of our ethics and governance-related achievements. Together with many of our fellow North American Reform congregations, we developed and implemented a Congregational Code of Ethics that sets out principles and expectations for adherence

to standards of conduct for our community. Also, we enhanced several Board related processes and procedures regarding succession planning for the role of President and running efficient and effective board meetings using technology, without retiring the trusty gavel. As well, we rewrote HBT by-laws to comply with a new Ontario requirement. In the Torah and in the Jewish tradition, leadership and governance are inextricably tied to our values and ethics.

People ask me what I enjoyed most and what surprised me most, about being President. It has been an honour to walk in the big shoes of my predecessors, and I am very grateful for their support and friendship. I've particularly enjoyed working in sacred partnership with Rabbi Splansky and Rachel Malach, our Executive Director. While I have worked as part of teams in a fairly large workplace, helping to lead a Jewish organization adds another dimension to a relationship. A sacred partnership is a commitment to building and nurturing relationships that elevate the work of leadership to a level of holiness. I will miss our weekly Wednesday meetings where we discuss everything from the sacred to the profane.

What surprised me the most? I am not unique in saying that I have been humbled and honoured during my time as President, regarding all that Holy Blossom does 365 days a year. In fact, being the risk manager that I am, I sometimes worried about our clergy and our professional staff being spread so thin. Fortunately, we are working on that. I have a much greater appreciation for what is involved in running the largest Reform congregation in Canada and one of the 20 largest Reform synagogues in North America. There are so many moving parts.

I am eternally grateful to our incredible clergy team, our very professional and amazing staff, the bright and enthusiastic lay leaders who sit on the Board of Directors, and countless unsung volunteers without whom Holy Blossom wouldn't be the vibrant, warm and welcoming community that we are today. Thank you for bestowing on me the pleasure and the honour of being President of the awesome Holy Blossom Temple.

Wishing you and your families a healthy and happy 5785, and a year filled with goodness, sweetness and peace. *Shanah Tovah*.

SIMANIM: SIGNS FOR A GOOD YEAR

We all know about the apple and the honey that we eat on Rosh Hashanah. The apple is round and represents the circle of life and the year that is coming, while the honey is sweet and represents all the sweetness we hope to receive this coming year.

This is an ancient custom we are all familiar with...but it is not the only symbolic food we eat on Rosh Hashanah! The 'symbolic foods' are called *simanim* in our Talmudic literature, beautified in the Sephardic tradition, and there are eight of them.

Each, like the apple and the honey, come with a corresponding symbol and an

with a corresponding symbol and an ancient Hebrew pun!

The ancient invocations come with a prayer for...

Dates, that all of our troubles will come to an end! Black-Eyed peas, anise, or sesame seeds, that our merits will multiply!

Leeks, that our enemies will be but cut off!

Chard or beets, that all who would harm us will be driven away!

Pumpkin or carrot, that God will rip up the verdict of judgment against us!

Pomegranate, that we will be as filled with mitzvot as the seeds of this fruit!

And of course... the apple and honey, so that we may have a sweet new year!

Ah...you noticed that there are only seven blessings here. Where is the eighth blessing?

This is the least popular one. It is over fish... heads. We pray that we should be like the head, and not the other end. Don't worry, those little red candy fish can do the job as well as any creature from the sea!

Every year it is my tradition to whip up a Rosh
Hashanah menu that captures the essence
of these blessings, and the ingredients
themselves, to serve to my family and
our guests. Last year we had chard and

carrot buerakas and leek pancakes from the Israeli restaurant down the street, home made stuffed Lebanese style zucchini, Egyptian black eyed pea stew, and some Moroccan spicy fish called *chraime*.

This year I'm still working on the menu! However, one of the things I look forward to most about Rosh Hashanah is the creative expressions of taking this ancient tradition and forging it anew every year.

That concept, the interplay between tradition and modernity, is one of the pillars of who we are here at Holy Blossom Temple. Looking forward to 5785, it remains one of the things I am most excited about and proud to continue working on. From co-teaching with my clergy colleagues so that our new members can feel more at home in this storied place, to continuing the Beit Midrash on Wednesday night and expanding new visions of our ancient texts. I'll be spending plenty of time with our teens, helping them navigate these challenging days and I'm proud to be taking them to Ottawa for the first Canadian L'taken! Of course, alongside our incredible lay people, we're continuing our mitzvah work in Tikkun Olam and Advocacy, where every year the challenges of our nation transform the tzedakah that we do and the people that we fight for.

5785 is also a year I'll also be traveling to Israel, where ancient and modern intertwine, and our history and our future dwell together.

There's a lot on the menu, both figuratively and literally, for this coming year. But it looks rich, exciting, and fulfilling for the body and soul. I hope you'll join me, and we can enjoy it together.

From my family to yours, *Shanah Tovah! Tizku L'Shanim Rabot!* May you merit many more good and healthy years!



HOME FROM THE HAPPY PLACE

The Sa'adiah Gaon teaches that there are ten reasons given for the blowing of the instrument from which the "tekiah" resounds: the shofar.

These reasons range from the shofar being a symbol of God's continued sovereignty, an

alarm clock to the work of repentance and awe of the Divine, a reminder of Abraham's attempted sacrifice of his beloved son Isaac, a hearkening to the Messianic era, and even, an echo of the primordial scream.

Each of these reasons comes to mind as I write this, having just returned from a week up at Camp George with our youngest of our Holy Blossom community.

Our theme of "tekiah," of a piercing noise calling us to attention, was palpable here more than ever on the magical Maple Lake.

Not just because they were loud, shouting and causing ruckus as only kids know how (perhaps this is the primordial scream...); they did it with joy, singing and dancing and cheering, revelling in their Jewish identities and friendships.

I could not be prouder of them as they were able to simply be their full selves, as campers, counsellors, and specialists for the summer, a necessary break after what I learned had been a particularly difficult ten months for our students.

In a panel with community leadership over Shabbat, the students – high schoolers and university-aged – described what they had been facing since October 7, enduring bullying (sometimes physical), harassment, and the loss of relationships as they navigated the veritable wave of antisemitism and anti-Zionist sentiment.

Yet, camp was there. Camp was the breath they needed to take. The hug they needed to feel. The silence they needed to hear. It was their "tekiah," their glorious stretch of almost two months of relief, happiness, and authenticity.

Each one of those young people spoke to the idea that their "tekiah" was the strength they felt from their people and their Jewish community, including their synagogues. Each of them also spoke about how their experiences made them stronger and surer of who they were and what they stood for as Jews.

In the time that has followed, I have been thinking about how we can be that "tekiah," that source of strength and resilience, to not just our youngest but to all members of our congregation.

The solution I've come to is that we are uniquely positioned to provide our members with safe spaces. Just like our campers, at Holy Blossom there is a place for each one of us to exhale, and to come together in strength and unity.

To highlight but a few examples from my portfolios:

- ★ Our Youth Education Centre (YEC) is back starting September 8th with an Open House and Grandparents Day intergenerational bonanza with our partners at PJ Library
- ❖ Our Bikkur Cholim (Caring Community)
 committee is hosting an open training on
 September 10 about the good work they do and
 their best pastoral practices for our volunteers
- ★ Dorot will launch for the fall season with a lively musical performance with our friends from Concerts in Care Ontario
- Our HaTzipporim (Empty Nesters) are kicking off their year of programming with a tour of Jewish Kensington on September 29

As we head into 5785, I encourage you to take heart from our students, to scream, to shout, to return, to reflect, to cry and to celebrate as we declare: "Tekiah!" - We are here, and we are strong.


2024 Annual Campaign and Our Growing Community


